New Computer Genealogy Lab Class

On Tuesday, September 8, 2015, Karen Ristic, the Genealogy SIG teacher, will begin a new class series in the Computer Lab from 9 a.m. to about 11 a.m. This series will run once a month for nine months on the <u>second Tuesday</u> of the month. This new lab class will help you learn to use on the computer the Genealogy software program, Family Tree Maker (FTM) version 2014. The lab contains 12 Windows computers, but you may bring your Mac computer with Family Tree Maker 2014 installed on it because both software versions are nearly identical, so the information presented is applicable to both platforms. You must be a current member of the Sun City Computer Club to participate. A basic familiarity with your computer is also recommended.

<u>Purpose</u>

The use of FTM will help you discover and preserve your family's heritage. It's quick and easy to use for those just starting to research their family history, but it's also robust enough for the most serious genealogist. You can use FTM to store, display, and print any kind of family information you want—from names, birth dates, marriages, and deaths to priceless family stories, pictures, and audio/video files. The ultimate goal for all participants is to eventually gather together their genealogical information, put it in the computer, print it, and share it.

The Computer Lab

There will be Windows computers to use so the limit will be 12 people. At the last Genealogy SIG Class in June, people in that class had the opportunity to sign up for this lab class. The First Class

The topics for this class are: 1) Using the Computer Lab, and 2) Getting Started with Family Tree Maker. Please bring: 1) a flash drive (there will be some for sale at this meeting) and 2) a paper copy of less than 50 of your ancestors / family members on paper with their birth, death, and marriage dates and places to enter into the computer. You will be able to save this information on your flash drive at the end of class — and you will be able to enter more people both at home and in the class.




Tom's Tech-Notes

Excel Formatting Tips Tom Burt, SCSCC Vice-President

This month, I decided to offer up a few handy formatting tips and tricks you can use in MS Excel 2010/2013. If you work with spreadsheets much, these are real time savers.

Quickly adjust column widths to exactly fit the contents of the column.

Often a column will contain varying length strings, such as e-mail addresses. You want to adjust the column width to be just wide enough to contain the widest string. A quick way to do this is hover the mouse in the column headers (A, B, C, ...) over the top right edge of the column. The cursor will turn into a small cross with horizontal arrows (see the green circle in the image below). Double click and the column to the left will adjust its width to that of the widest value. This works with any type of data in the column.




Merge and Center Multi-column Headline Cells

Often, it's nice to have a centered headline at the top of a set of columns. (See the screen shot below). The quick way to do this is to enter the headline text into the leftmost cell in the row that will hold the centered headline. Then drag the mouse left to right across the range of cells that will hold the centered headline. In the diagram below, this would be A1 through C1. Finally click the Merge & Center icon in


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the ribbon. This will merge the selected cells and center the text in one step. Adjust the font face, size, weight and color to suit.



Quick Format Numbers, Currency and Percentages

Drag the mouse through a range of plain number cells and then click the \$ icon (see the screen shot) to reformat them as currency values. You can also use the "%" icon for fractional values and the "," icon for large numerical values. Experiment to see the results.

Kretchmar's Korner By David Kretchmar, Computer Hardware Technician My First Impressions of Windows 10



I have downloaded and installed Windows 10 Home on my new laptop and Windows 10 Professional on my tower, both starting with Win8.1, fully updated. The Windows 8.1 installation on my laptop was a new OEM system. Windows 8.1 on my desktop was based on the \$40 upgrade license from Win7 Microsoft sold when Windows 8

was originally released.

I had not "reserved" Win10, so when I clicked on the Taskbar icon I got a message that I would be notified when my installation was ready and it might be days or weeks.

How to Get It

Being impatient and curious I went directly to Microsoft http://www.microsoft.com/en-us/software-download/windows10 and downloaded the installation files and installed the OS from my desktop. I also downloaded the Win10 ISO file and burned it to a DVD.



Make Backups Prior to Upgrading to Win 10

Prior to the installations I created system backups of my computers, using the Microsoft system backup left in Windows 8, software originally from Windows 7. I did not need these backups, but better safe than sorry.

Installation of Win10

The installation to my tower failed the first attempt, returning me to Win8. 1. I unplugged my USB external drive and USB headset and Win10 installed without a hitch.

The installation to my laptop seemed almost effortless, taking about an hour with user input required only at the beginning and when the installation completed.

The Home Premium installation on my laptop blew away Microsoft's Archrival Google Chrome, requiring a reinstall, but no other programs or files seem to be effected. The desktop installation of Win10 Pro left Chrome unaffected.



Microsoft Edge



Internet Explorer has been replaced by a new browser, Microsoft Edge. I was surprised that Edge did not pick up my Favorites and other settings from IE, especially when Firefox and Chrome retained all of my data. I was able to import my Favorites from Internet Explorer with just a couple of clicks.

Cortana




Cortana, Microsoft's "Digital Assistant" has not worked very well for me so far, but I'll give an opportunity for us to get to know each other before I make any final judgements. So far her answer to most of my questions has been a Bing search page. Her favorite color is pink.

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System Backup

I was happy that Win10 has retained Windows 7 System Image, which is still named "Backup and Restore (Windows 7)" in Win10. After installation and configuration of Win10 I created a system image on an external USB drive and I created a rescue disk.



Lock Down Your WI-FI

By default, Windows 10 shares your Internet connection over Wi-Fi. This is a worthwhile feature if you want it, but there have been suggestions, from a few, this could open your system to hackers. The security dangers seem exaggerated. Just to be on the safe side, I disabled Wi-Fi sharing, using Settings from the Start menu – very handy.

Looking under the hood of the Win10 OS I see very little change from Win8.

Conclusions

Any user comfortable with Windows 8 should be able to hit the ground running with Win10. In fact I believe even Windows 7 users will be able to make the transition to Win10 fairly easily, certainly more easily that those of us who went from Win7 to Win8.

I believe the most significant change for most users will be the integration of the start menu, and the start menu apps, in the desktop. This seemed so intuitive and natural I wonder why Microsoft did not do this with Win8.
