Tom's Tech-Notes

Free Windows Programming Tools - Redux

This is an update to an article I wrote in July, 2014.


Most of our members are content to simply use software programs that are provided with their operating system, or programs that they purchase or download for free. However, a few may wish to have the freedom and flexibility that comes with being able to create your own custom programs to do some specific function or to use a preferred user interface. Programming an application for Windows can be daunting because so much of the coding effort goes into managing the screen, keyboard and mouse interactions.

For several years, Microsoft has been providing a free version of their developer tools. The newest version is called **Visual Studio 2015 Community**. It includes the Visual Basic, Visual C#, Visual C++ (and other) languages, an extensive set of built in interactive components, plus an Integrated Development Environment with debugger and Microsoft's "Intellisource" assistance to make Windows programming easier than ever. It is designed to run on Windows 10, 8 and 7. It can create many types of applications, including traditional desktop apps, "/Universal/Modern/Metro" apps and web applications. The 2015 edition also supports building applications for IOS and Android.

Space here doesn't permit me to even scratch the surface of programming in Visual Studio, which uses the Dot Net framework runtime environment. However, for those interested, I built a simple digital clock-calendar gadget using the earlier VB.Net 2013 version. I use this daily to cross check dates and days for the various websites I maintain. The source code and .EXE file are available to download in a .ZIP file from the smnr area of the Club website at: www.scs-cc.com/smnr/DClockCalendar.zip.



Here are some screen shots of the gadget:




Clock-Calendar gadget showing calendar

When fully opened up, the gadget shows both the running time and the calendar. The current date is displayed in the title bar. You can *hide* the calendar part by clicking the small up arrow button to the upper right. You can *show* the calendar by clicking the down arrow button.

To change the settings of the clock, click the Options button. That will open up an Options dialog that lets you change various settings for the running clock such as font, text color, background color, 12-hour or 24 hour format and whether to display seconds along with hours and minutes. You can drag the gadget to any location on the screen. When you close the gadget by clicking the red X, it will remember its last position and automatically use that for its display window.

If you choose to download the DClockCalendar.zip file, save it to a folder on your hard drive. Navigate to that foldet with Windows Explorer, double click the DClockCalendar.zip file to display its contents and finally select Extract to extract the contents of DClockCalendar.zip. Extract into the same folder as the .zip file is in.

To run the gadget, just double-click on the DClockCalendar.exe file. To make a desktop shortcut, left click the DClockCalendar.exe file to select it, then right-click to bring up a context menu. Choose "Send to" and then "Desktop (create shortcut)".

To view the source code you must first have installed Visual Studio 2015 Community. Double click the DClockCalendar.vbproj file in the extracted set of files. From there you're off and running.

The gadget itself is built as a pair of Windows form objects with some custom control objects (calendar, text box, timer and a couple of buttons) with supporting event handlers. As Windows programs go, it's quite simple – no file I/O, no database I/O.

Kretchmar's Korner

Invisible Browsing and Searching Protecting Your Privacy on the Internet

As you browse the web, your browser remembers lots of information for you - like the sites you've visited. There may be times when you don't want people with access to your computer to see this information. Invisible (AKA InPrivate, Private, or Incognito, depending on the browser you use) browsing allows you to browse the Internet without saving any information on your computer about searches you've made, or websites and pages you've visited.

Any files you download and save to your computer while you are invisible mode will still remain on your system.

Private browsing helps keep you from being bombarded with advertisements relating to any product or service you've researched or bought on the Internet. Searches done privately cannot be filtered or modified based on any information previously gathered about you; therefore you can be assured get a less pre-selected and filtered view of the world.

Remember that any browsers' private mode only keeps that browser from storing information about the websites that you have visited. The websites you visit may still have a record of your visit, although they should <u>not</u> be able to identify you by name or know personal information about you, unless you provide it. A site on the Internet will only see you as your Internet Protocol (IP) address; an IP address is something like, "68.227.63.194". This is all a site knows about you by virtue of your viewing the site, either in private mode or not. An analysis of that address reveals it belongs to Cox Communications in Las Vegas, but that's about all.

Internet Service Providers such as Cox and CenturyLink can and do store information about your surfing habits, which could make that 'incognito' surfing session on Google Chrome a little less incognito than you might think. Cox and CenturyLink do not reveal a customer's IP address logs without process (usually a summons or court order).

Cox states that it retains surfing records up to 6 months, and CenturyLink says it retains these records for a year.

Currently there are no mandatory data retention laws in the United States. In Europe, Internet providers are required to track IP-address assignments so these can be linked to specific subscriber accounts.

There are Congressional proponents in favor of passing laws that would effectively reduce privacy on the Internet. This will be accomplished under a bill titled something like, "Protecting Children from Internet Pornographers Act" or "Securing our Homeland from Terrorists Act"; ISPs will be required to keep detailed IP-address logs for a specific period of time.

For now, however, no logs are required by law.

If you want to get serious about protecting your privacy on the Internet, here's how private browsing works in Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox, and Google Chrome.

Internet Explorer

Open Internet Explorer, click on the Gear icon in the upper right corner of you Internet Explorer browser window, Safety, and then select "InPrivate Browsing". Alternately if you are showing your menu bar the path is Tools, "InPrivate Browsing".

Mozilla Firefox

Open Firefox, click on the 3 horizontal lines at the top right corner of the window, and click on "New Private Window".

Google Chrome

Open Chrome, click on the 3 horizontal lines at the top right corner of the window, and click on "New Incognito Window".

Another Privacy Tool: DuckDuckGo "The search engine that doesn't track you."

DuckDuckGo is an anonymous search engine that has been around for just about 6 years. It can be accessed using any browser by entering duckduckgo.com in the browser address bar.

DuckDuckGo was completely redesigned and released in May 2014, so if you've been disappointed by the product in the past, you might want to give it another try.

I compared DuckDuckGo to Google in searching power, and the results were very similar. DuckDuckGo calls itself a search engine of search engines and I have to wonder if Google results are among the results included.

DuckDuckGo is weak in such areas as maps and conversions and of course cannot offer anything close to the full Google Chrome experience (and privacy compromise).

DuckDuckGo has a porn filter on by default, which might be a plus for some. It also seems to do a slightly better job than Google of identifying which search results are paid ads, and which results are from a reasonably reliable source.

By Doing a search in DuckDuckGo or in invisible mode in your browser, you can maintain your privacy and avoid the advertising thrown at you based on data harvested from your Internet activity.
