Security


- Past security concerns were, primarily, with computer viruses.
 - Virus writers were interested, primarily, in causing inconvenience to as many as possible.
 - Bragging rights within the hacker community.
 - Macs were relatively safe.
 - Macs are fewer in number than PCs (security by obscurity).
 - Also, Macs (OSX) are inherently more secure.
- Today virus writers are money motivated.
 - Domestic and international *organized-crime* organizations are involved.
 - Employing skilled computer programmers (many out-of-work).
 - Goals are; identity theft, access to credit-card information, and financial account information.
 - Social engineering; getting people to give up information voluntarily.
 - Example: calling the help desk at large company and posing as an employee who lost their password.
- On the web, *phishing* is commonly used.
 - · PayPal example.
 - May include personal information e.g. name, bank or credit card issuer.
 - Think twice before providing any personal information.
 - If an email or web page appears to be from your credit card issuer, and appears genuine i.e. has your name and/or the last four digits of your

credit card number - do not click on any links. Call the number on the back of your card, *not* the number in the email.

- Be wary of requests to download files, viewers and unknown updates.
 - When in doubt, enter the URL into the browser's address bar yourself rather than clicking on a link in an email or on a website.
 - Example: a site may provide a link to install or update Adobe Reader or Adobe Flash. Go to the Adobe web site: download and install the software yourself.


Smart Folders



Use Smart Folders to collect files that meet specified search criteria.

- To create a Smart Folder.
- In the Finder menu bar choose: File -> New Smart Folder.
 - Enter your search criterion in the box at the upper right.
 - Select where to search:
 - Which disk drive to search
 - This Mac search all connected disk drives.

- G5-Leopard (your computer's name may be different) search the startup drive.
- Select what to search for...
 - Contents files containing the search criteria.
 - File Name files with the search criterion in the filename.



- Using Smart Folders.
- Double-click on an item in the Smart Folder to open or view it (depending on the item).
- Single-click on an item to display its location at the bottom of the window.
- · Click on the Save button to save your Smart Folder.
 - As you add, delete or change files, OSX will update the Smart Folder's contents.

Apple's New Mac App Store

Similar to the App Store for the iPod/iPhone/iPad devices.

- The new App Store application is included with the Snow Leopard update 10.6.6.
- It is in the Applications folder as *App Store.app*.
- Purchase and download Apple and non-Apple applications.
- There are also some freebies available.
- Some of the individual components of iLife and iWork can be purchased individually.
 - iPhoto can be purchased for \$14.99 rather than purchasing the iLife suite for \$49.00.
 - Aperture is quite a bargain at \$79 rather than \$199.
 - Purchased or downloaded apps can be updated.
